#### **PURPOSE**

"Lev Detroit, powered by Jewish Family Service, has frum and culturally sensitive staff to provide guidance, compassion and reassurance to members of Detroit's Orthodox Community. Whether connecting you to JFS programs or providing referrals to resources in the community, when you're not sure where to turn for help, turn to Lev Detroit."

This is the premise and pitch for Lev Detroit, a new Jewish Family Service initiative designed to deepen and diversify engagement with the local Orthodox community. In addition to more effectively guiding people to existing resources, JFS is exploring new Lev Detroit programs designed to meet the unique needs and interests of the community.

Lev Groups will offer an evidence-based modality tailored to lower barriers to entry for Orthodox women and girls -- facilitated, convenings where participants can hone tools and relationships that enhance their individual health and the social wellness of their families and community. Lev groups will build upon the existing human-service infrastructure of JFS and the expanding relationships in the Orthodox Community, along with recognized curricula and iterative program development.

JFS will offer two primary categories of Lev Groups: skill-building and therapeutic. Each Skill-Building Group will have a curriculum designed to help participants navigate a particular developmental or life stage. Therapeutic Groups will offer support for women or girls who have a traumatic experience or challenging circumstances in common.

Prospective Skill-Building and Therapeutic/Support Groups include:

Mothers of Young Children



Conscious Discipline, "a social-emotional intelligence system based on current brain research that teaches adults to respond, rather than react, to life events" has adaptable tools for trauma-informed care and a strong track record in other Orthodox communities.

#### Ages and Stages

Another group for moms, Ages and Stages will focus on expanding a parenting toolkit to support children at multiple stages of development.

#### Girls' Social Skills

In conjunction with the JFS social workers placed at area Orthodox schools, students will receive age-appropriate content -- lower and upper elementary -- in a space where they can ask questions and share concerns.

#### Resilience in Adolescence

These groups will address issues common to all teens and particular to young women in the Orthodox community.

#### **ORGANIZATION DESCRIPTION**

Founded in 1928, Jewish Family Service is a non-sectarian nonprofit health and social services organization that provides a safety net for those struggling with difficult situations. Inspired by the wisdom and values of Jewish tradition, we strengthen lives through compassionate service.

The agency serves people of all ages, religions and socioeconomic backgrounds through a variety of programs including case management, geriatric care management, counseling, Meals on Wheels, home care, transportation, volunteer services, immigration and citizenship services and access to health care. JFS maintains a special focus on serving the unique needs of the Jewish community, and the agency functions as a "central address" for Jews in our region who need help. JFS uses a strength-based and person-centered approach to help vulnerable members of our community, partnering with them to create lives of personal value.

JFS's staff of more than 100 professionals possesses an extensive and diverse range of competencies and specializations, equipping the agency with the flexibility and knowledge required to meet the community's evolving needs. And the more than 1,000 volunteers who donate their time each year help to enhance and support our core services. JFS is accredited by the Council on Accreditation (COA).

#### RATIONALE (NEED)

Everyone who seeks support from Jewish Family Service has to overcome one barrier or another to getting the help they need. For everyone who picks up the phone to call jHelp, there is someone else -- or multiple others -- who do not. Those barriers can be exceptionally high for a group that provides disproportionate support and stability to those around them: Orthodox women.



Stigma associated with accessing mental health and social services is magnified by the close-knit nature, religious observance and gender roles of the Orthodox community. In the absence of accessible spaces and professional support, individuals often rely on relationships and organizations within the community that, lacking mental health expertise, can reinforce social mores and expectations that are at cross purposes with the pursuit of healthy outcomes.

Lev Detroit Groups will offer distinct benefits for Orthodox women and girls, proactively building skills relevant to their life stage and cultivating a therapeutic environment for dealing with trauma, anxiety and hardship. Lev Groups will create safe spaces for where participants have a "kosher" female-only setting facilitated by mental health professionals, informed by evidence-based practice and enriched by each other's lived experiences.

#### **ACTIVITIES AND OUTCOMES**

Lev Detroit Groups will vary in their subject matter and scope but will have the following best practices in common:

- Size: Between 4 and 12 participants.
- Staff: Two professional facilitators, at least one of whom is a recognized member of the community.
- Participants: Identified as appropriate for the content and committed to full participation in advance of the first session.
- Venue: Spaces that are accessible and conducive to the skill-building and therapeutic goals.
- Confidential
- Diagnostic: Facilitators empowered, discrete from the rest of the group, to make individual referrals to mental health of social services.
- Evaluation and Iteration: Feedback solicited and synthesized to enhance subsequent Groups.



• Post-Program: Ensuring participants have direct access to appropriate resources following the conclusion of group programming.

Skill-Building Groups will take participants through curricula relevant for settings and challenges they can expect to encounter -- and, just as importantly, space to talk through or act out realistic scenarios. Therapeutic/Support Groups will introduce methodologies and tools for coping with past or ongoing adversity.

Anticipated outcomes for Skill-Building and Therapeutic/Support Groups include both the solidarity of sharing experiences with peers and the following issue-area benefits:

- Mothers of Young Children: Parenting tactics calibrated to the brain development.
- Ages and Stages: Strategies for fostering harmony and mediating conflict in households with children spanning a range of developmental stages.
- Girls' Social Skills: Positive self-image as a vehicle for building durable peer relationships.
- Resilience in Adolescence: Access to actionable information about making healthy decisions in all-female and co-ed settings.

An additional outcome would be a referral for individual counseling or other support services. Rooted in the trust-based group experience, a participant will likely be more receptive to the suggestion and better able to access appropriate services with discretion and dignity.

#### **SOCIAL IMPACT**

With the right practices and interventions, Orthodox women and girls can develop identities, skills and resiliency that not only help them lead healthy lives but also have a catalytic social impact on their community.

The article "Improving Access to Mental Health Care in an Orthodox Jewish Community: A Critical Reflection Upon the Accommodation of Otherness" describes the unique challenges and opportunities for Orthodox Jews. Research has suggested that "self-improvement" and "growth" are common and accepted ideas in the community; groups framed in a positive, proactive way yield higher participation. Alternatively, groups suggesting a "stigmatizing factor" will likely struggle to gain traction.

JFS has succeeded in promoting awareness and prevention, through the buy-in of Orthodox individuals and institutions, on a highly stigmatized subject: child abuse. Safety Kid -- a comprehensive child abuse prevention program for school staff, parents and children -- is designed specifically for Orthodox Jewish communities. Annually since 2015, over 1,000 students (ages 4-11), teachers, administrators and parents have participated in the program.

Women and girls who have a socially acceptable alternative addressing their own mental health -- internalizing others' expectations, ignoring anxiety or compartmentalizing trauma -- will helm healthier households and further their leadership in the community.
